This tutorial is dedicated to research methods: the trajectory from historiographical debate through research question to an effective research strategy. In this interactive tutorial, the central questions are: what is the use of historical methodology, what is your methodological approach, how does your topic legitimize your research methods, and what are the major methodological challenges of your research project?

In the tutorial Methods & Techniques, PhD candidates reflect on the abovementioned questions, present their most urgent methodological bottleneck and try to find the best strategy to solve their problems together with other PhD candidates and senior researchers Joris Gijsenbergh and Dirk Jan Wolffram. During the tutorial, we will discuss your choices and your bottlenecks both plenary and in small groups. In this way we can learn from each other and inspire each other.

### Preparations

1. Read the required literature.
2. Prepare a statement of circa 750-1000 words, which states your research question, a reflection on the readings of Gunn/Faire (on the necessity of precise methodology) and Cavazza (on the tension between history-writing and social sciences) with regard to your research project, as well as your most urgent methodological bottleneck. Add the title of a recent PhD-dissertation of your own choice, related to the topic of your PhD-research project. Read the Introduction/methodological chapter of this PhD-dissertation as reference and/or source of inspiration. 3. In this Tutorial, the emphasis is on the group session. We will compose groups prior to the Tutorial, participants read the texts of the group members and prepare the discussion by reflecting on the nature of the similarities and differences in each other's methodological approaches, and relate these to the readings of Gunn/Faire and Cavazza. We would like to emphasize that the group discussions take place in an atmosphere of openness and confidentiality.
