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# Writing Your First Academic Publications: Strategies and Considerations

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- Consider your post-PhD career: inside or outside academia
- Build your publication profile accordingly
- Orient towards the country you want to have your professional career but do not lose sight of an international publication profile



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- During your PhD
  - Consider categories of academic publications: book reviews, review essays, chapters in edited volumes, journal articles



- During your PhD: book reviews
  - Pros: allow for careful discussion of a contribution to the field, based in part on your own expertise and how field is, or should be, advanced
  - Cons: time-consuming, carry little weight for academic CV, little to no room for input of own research



- During your PhD: review essays
  - Pros: allow for careful discussion of series of publications, done in greater depth, place within wider context of state of scholarship, and structured around own assessment
  - Cons: very time-consuming, carries more weight than book review, but less than other academic publications based on own research, little room for own input, require considerable knowledge of the field



- During your PhD: chapters in edited volumes
  - Pros: discussion of own research within a thematic collection of papers, peer review from volume editors
  - Cons: need to be geared toward theme of the volume, less room for individual research than journal article, carry less weight than journal article, pay attention to publisher



- During your PhD: journal article
  - Pros: discussion of own research in full-length article, carries considerable weight for CV, especially for high-ranking journals, blind peer review
  - Cons: many journals have low acceptance rate, can be time-consuming, considerable (and often unjust) difference in ranking of journals, blind peer review



- During your PhD
  - Consider your portfolio of publications
  - Consider time-investment in major academic publications
  - Consider their relevance: gathering feedback, discuss a particular case study, set out new direction of research, 'dump' material that cannot be incorporated in the thesis
  - Consider single-authored or multi-authored
  - Consider language and accessibility



- After your PhD: thesis into monograph
  - Consider publishing instantly after PhD defence or after period of time
  - Consider publishing as academic monograph or aimed at non-academic audience
  - Consider writing as two books: academic monograph AND for non-academic audience
  - Consider publisher: academic reputation, quality of publishing process, copy-editing, costs involved (if applicable), PR



- Bear in mind:
  - PhD is unique chance to write series of publications, especially a book; chance might not come again
  - Use publications to develop research, expertise and (international) academic profile
  - Academic publications are not the sole requirement on a good academic CV, but do constitute the nucleus
